Faculty Bio: PhD Philosophy, University of Iowa; BS in Biology and Philosophy, UW-La Crosse. Publications include articles in ethics, medieval philosophy, philosophy of religion, and a textbook, *The Philosopher's Tool Kit*. In graduate school I emphasized medieval philosophy and ethical theory.

General Description

This course provides a systematic evaluation of classical and/or contemporary ethical theories concerning the good life, human conduct in society, morals, and standards of value.

Course Objectives: Upon completion of this course, the student will:

- Read, analyze, and critique philosophical texts.
- Define and appropriately use important terms such as relativism, virtue, duty, rights, utilitarianism, natural law, egoism, altruism, autonomy, and care ethics.
- Demonstrate knowledge of major arguments and problems in ethics.
- Present and discuss well-reasoned ethical positions in writing.
- Apply ethical concepts and principles to address moral concerns.
- Demonstrate an ability to discuss and reflect upon the application of the course material to various aspects of life.
- Reflect upon and discuss ways of living responsibly in a world where people have diverse ethical beliefs.

REQUIRED TEXTS: None. Readings are public domain, online.

English Prerequisites:

- College-level Readiness in Reading and Writing

Course Procedures

This course has a standard, on-ground lecture format. The lectures can be heard as often as you like using audio-PowerPoints files available on my personal website for download, 24/7. Those files are very large, so, anyone with a slow Internet connection can bring a thumb drive by my office to download them. There may be some informal, spontaneous small-group activities in class.
